Hello everyone,

As I sit down to write my last President's letter for the WAVE, I am reflecting on the past two years. As some of you may know, I could not attend the swearing-in of officers two years ago. I was in NJ undergoing medical treatment. However, I was able to attend the Planning and Budget meetings in Florida that year.

The club has faced some challenges in the past two years, but we have emerged stronger than ever. This past year we have donated over \$29,000 in scholarships, grants, and support for groups like the Dolly Parton Imagination Library and Take Stock in Children. We have given funds for personal advancement to women in our community through the Family Life Center and Habitat for Humanity. We have also set up an endowment through the Daytona State College Foundation. The first recipient of that grant was a single mother who has graduated and is working as a nurse in the Advent hospital system. This month, we will be giving college scholarships to six young women from the local high schools.

Kudos to Pat Rhodes and her committee for a successful Day of Games that netted over \$6000 in April. Barbara Holley and her committee worked hard on a Fashion Show in February with Chez Jacqueline that earned over \$4000.

Various other fundraisers like Wreaths Across America, the Dow Jones raffle, Jersey Mike's sales, Texas Roadhouse sales, Food Truck Tuesday and the UWF tee shirt sale, all helped to earn money for the club. Those who attended general meetings donated to the Share & Share raffles. Last but not least are the fees collected from members who participated in Bookminders, SIS, Adventure Gals, and Gourmet Gals events.

Our club could not exist without the generosity and support of all our members. So I want to thank you all and wish our new Co-Presidents, Robin Hall and Trish Le Net, a successful year ahead.

Scholarship Committee Update From Jeanne Nix, Committee Chair

Shhhhh!!! This news is still top secret! Your UWF Scholarship Committee (Pat Cotton, Pearl Jones, Trish Le Net, Jeanne Nix, Lee Ross, and Sheila Walls) is pleased to announce that they have winnowed through the scholarship applicants and have made their final selections. The names of the six recipients will be announced at the Senior Scholarship Nights, Tuesday, May 7 (for Flagler Palm Coast High School) and Wednesday, May 8 (for Matanzas High School). UWF members will have a chance to meet the scholarship winners and the returning student award winners at our breakfast on Saturday, May 11 at the Hilton Garden Inn.

To recap: our scholarship selection process begins in the fall when UWF commits to providing a specific number of scholarships to be awarded through the Flagler County Education Foundation. In 2012, UWF gave three scholarships of \$1500 each to three graduating seniors from Flagler County. In 2013, UWF stepped up to offer not just the three \$1500 scholarships, but also to offer three \$500 scholarships to the same winners on completion of their freshman year - something to get them started as they entered their second year of university.

The amount of the scholarship has increased over the years, along with the rising cost of college. In some years, UWF has awarded five \$3000 scholarships and six \$500 scholarships. What an achievement for UWF! This spring of 2024, UWF will be awarding six \$3000 scholarships - one generously donated by Jo Dervan in the name of her late husband, Richard Dervan, one generously donated by Lee Ross in the name of her sister-in-law Gail Ross, and one generously donated by Rhenda Brodnax in the name of her late husband Clarence W. Brodnax. The number of UWF scholarships granted depends on the amount of money our group has raised the previous year. We also accept scholarship donations from UWF members and members of the community. Since the organization began in 2006, we have granted over eighty scholarships for a total of over \$117,000 in scholarship awards. Good work, ladies!
